# Architectural Officer's Report



Apart from being the Architectural Officer for Construction Specifications Canada, Toronto Chapter Executive, I am also pleased to report that I continue to be an active member of Association of Architectural Technologists of Ontario (AATO), the Ontario Association of Applied Architectural Sciences (OAAAS) and the Ontario Association of Building Officials (OBOA) and their goals are similar to CSC when it comes to educating college and university students in the advancement of their careers in architecture. My personal goal is to bring CSC, AATO, OAAAS and OBOA even closer together, with the hope of some kind of meaningful future affiliation for the benefit everyone.

At the AATO's Annual General Meeting, held in the Blue Mountain Resort at the end of April 2013, I pledged to form a new Committee, the Student Liaison Committee (SLC) and over the summer months I wrote a draft policy for the committee that was implemented in fall semester throughout most of the Ontario Colleges that have an approved Architectural Technology and Building Science Program.

The intent of the SLC policy is to ensure that the Student Liaison Director is appointed by, and sits on Council in strict accordance with the AATO Act and Bylaws, something that did not happen in recent years. The objective, in short, is for each college or university to form their own AATO student liaison subcommittee, then each subcommittee will elect their own chair, then each of those chairs will sit on the SLC and, in turn, they will elect their Chair who will automatically become the twelfth AATO Councilor/Director with full voting rights. The aim is that the Student Liaison will be the catalyst between the AATO and the Colleges to share, review and implement ideas and concerns that either party may have; that will, ultimately improve the overall curriculum for the betterment of the profession as a whole. I believe that the CSC could also benefit by having a student representative sitting on the Chapter Executive.

Throughout the year, I have attended several of the colleges giving presentations, adjudicating student projects and attending award ceremonies, convocations and providing the odd lecture on the Ontario Building Code. I sit on four Architectural Program Advisory Committees (PAC) and chair two of them (Sheridan and George Brown). On occasions, I have attended colleges with, or on behalf of our current Student Liaison Officer (SLO), Steve loannides who has gracefully passed on the torch to me to take on the role of SLO for the 2014/2015 term. I am delighted to be able do this as part of my main role as Architectural Officer.

Although the AATO Student Liaison Program is a first step, it is something that I would be very keen to see be endorsed by other Associations and Organizations within the industry and in particular CSC, OBOA and OAAAS. As I mentioned previously in this article, one of my personal goals (and it is only my opinion) but I would like to see a much closer relationship between the AATO and OAAAS as I think both could benefit from each other. My belief is that many AATO members who are fully Accredited Architectural Technologists would relish the opportunity to improve their qualifications and scope of work by taking advantage of the Licensed Technologist OAA model, by taking the OAA Lecture Series and Entrance Examination with an exemption to all the prerequisites required by interns.

On the other hand, I also believe that the majority of Technologists OAAAS and Licensed Technologists OAA would love to see the word "Architectural" added to their designation but, at present they cannot because "Architectural Technologist" is a protected title that belongs to the AATO. However, if some form of a reciprocal membership arrangement, such as a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) were to be introduced, perhaps some serious benefits could be accomplished by both Associations. The MOU would allow Accredited Architectural Technologists AATO to achieve a higher level of credentials through the OAA program and Technologists OAAAS and Licensed Technologists OAA could use "Architectural" to change their designation to Arch. Tech. OAAAS and Lic. Arch. Tech. OAA.

In an attempt to bring together a meaningful relationship between OBOA and CSC we have invited Aubrey Le Blanc, Chief Administration Officer of the OBOA to mediate a brain storming, think tank session to develop our CSC Toronto – Vision 2020. I feel that this will assist us immensely with our future planning of the Toronto Chapter.
