# Construction Contract Administration Education Course

Advance Notice

Contract administration involves the timely flow of information and decisions to enable completion of the project as required by the contract documents. Contract administration includes review and observation of the construction project. This is important to the Owner and Consultant not only to determine that the work is proceeding in conformity with the contract documents, but also because it allows a final opportunity to detect any inaccuracies ambiguities or inconsistencies in the design.

The objective of the CCA program is to improve construction contract administration by providing education related to the under-standing, administration and enforcement of contract requirements during the construction phase of the project. The CCA Program recognizes the experience, integrity and competence of construction contract administrators.

This advanced level course will take the individual beyond the concepts previously introduced in the PCD course. Although some of the same topics are included in this course, the depth of understanding and explanation exceed that of the PCD course.

## Blacklisted Bidders: Use of disbarment clauses in tenders By Jared D. Epp, Roberson Stromberg LLP

In certain jurisdictions there has been a growing emphasis in the public sector on preventing "known bad actors" from bidding on public construction projects. To the government, these "disbarment clauses" are justified on the basis that it is not in the best interests of the public to award work to "litigious contractors" or to contractors who have a history of performance or safety issues. To a "blacklisted" contractor, however, these disbarment clauses are often perceived as an attempt by the government to exercise leverage over contractors by discouraging contractors from pursuing their legal rights through the courts. Disbarment clauses can be found in a variety of different documents, including in the instructions to bidders and even in municipal bylaws.

Whether or not disbarment clauses are enforceable was recently considered by an Ontario court in Interpaving Limited v. City of Greater Sudbury. The particular bylaw in issue in that case read as follows:

(2) A Bidder or Supplier may be excluded from eligibility to submit Bids or quotes or a submitted Bid or quote may be summarily rejected and returned to a Bidder or Supplier where the Agent and the applicable [Senior Management Team Member] agree, in consultation with the City Solicitor, in their absolute sole discretion that one of the following circumstances has occurred:

(a) the Bidder or Supplier is or has been involved in Litigation with the City, its elected officials, officers or employees;

(c) there is documented evidence of poor performance, non-performance or default by the Bidder or Supplier in respect to any Contract;

•••

(g) the Bidder, Supplier or its personnel have demonstrated abusive behaviour or threatening conduct towards City employees, their agents or representatives;

The City of Greater Sudbury claimed that Interpaving, who had worked for the City for more than 40 years, was in violation of each of these provisions. The City cited a number of violations that had been committed by Interpaving including:





Interpaving had commenced a lawsuit against the City seeking payment in relation to five different City projects;

Interpaving had a history of violating health and safety legislation, including one serious incident, which was under appeal, involving a pedestrian that had been killed by a construction vehicle, while the pedestrian was entering into an "Interpaving construction zone"; and

Interpaving was, as a general matter, abusive and threatening in its interactions with the City.

As a result of these violations, the City issued a decision barring Interpaving from bidding on any City projects for a period of four years. Interpaving challenged this decision arguing both that the bylaw itself was invalid and that the decision to disbar Interpaving, on the basis of conduct that occurred prior to the bylaw being passed, was unreasonable.

In addressing Interpaving's first argument that the bylaw was invalid, the Court held that the City, like any private person, had an inherent right to decide with whom to do business. No one, in other words, has an inherent right to bid on public sector work.

The Court also concluded that the decision to disbar Interpaving, based on its past conduct, for a period of four years was reasonable. Given the strained relations that existed between the parties, a certain "cooling off" period before regular relations might resume again was to be expected. As a result, Interpaving's court application was dismissed, and the Court upheld the City's decision to disbar Interpaving from bidding on future projects.

Although the *Interpaving* decision took place in the context of a challenge to a municipal bylaw, many of the comments made by the Court are equally applicable to disbarment clauses that are relied upon by owners in their instructions to bidders. Owners, who seek to rely on such clauses, must be prepared to justify how it is in the public's interest to prevent a contractor from bidding on public work. Although it is clear that some type of disbarment clause is permissible, the scope of such clauses has still not been definitively resolved by the courts.
