IS THE PROVINCE AND THE MUNICIPALITIES DOING ENOUGH ABOUT AFFORDABLE HOUSING?

I would like to take this opportunity to wish you an enjoyable end to the summer and start of an exciting new Toronto Chapter term starting this September 2025 through 2026.

As you are all no doubt aware there has been a lot of talk about increasing the affordable housing stock and streamlining the approval process to make it happen in short order but, to be honest, this has become the really impossible dream with, unfortunately, still too much red tape!

As an architectural designer, eager to help, I am finding that it's not that easy and there is still a lot of work to be done to make this a reality!

I want to share with you one of the most exacerbating projects that I have been working on for the past two years.

As the project is still on going, I am not going to reveal where the project is located and what municipality it is within. However, when I describe the ridiculous steps that I have had to endure, I think you will appreciate why I think a lot more has to be done and expedited to make affordable housing a reality.

In September 2023, I was appointed as lead consultant to obtain Building Permits for the addition of 21 affordable rental units within an existing apartment building, utilizing wasted space such as unused locker rooms, old storage rooms and utility spaces. The building already contained 205 finished rental units, the additional 21 would make a total of 226 units.

Once I was commissioned, my first job was to measure the available spaces and produce as built, existing drawings of the 21 spaces. The building has multiple storeys and there are some repetitions of unit layouts that allowed me to create concept plans for 7 individual model types.

In order to proceed with process, I submitted the concept drawings to the municipality for a zoning review, only to learn that they would require site plan approval.

After several months of waiting, I finally was able to have a virtual meeting with the city planners in March 2024. What really irritated me was the outcome of that meeting. They informed me after a lengthy conversation that I didn't need site plan approval after all as all the construction would be internal and would not affect the site.



However, they did inform me that there would be a deficiency in parking related to the new units and that I should check with the zoning department.

Following months of back and forth with the zoning department. It was determined that there would be four minor variances that would need to be approved by the Committee of Adjustment. the minor variances required were almost a joke:

- 1. No visitor parking spaces for the additional 21 units, instead of 3 required.
- 2. No accessible parking spaces for the additional 21 units, instead of 2 required.
- 3. No short-term bicycle parking, instead of 2 required.
- 4. No long-term bicycle parking, instead of 14 required.

Once I received the notice and stopped laughing, I revisited the overall concept and was sure that I could eliminate three of the variances. In November 2024, I attended the Committee of Adjustment hearing and when I described to the Committee how I could

...eliminate three of the variances, they decided to defer the hearing until I could demonstrate, on paper, how I could take away three variances. So, over the next few weeks I was able to increase two parking spaces to create accessible parking, added an exterior bicycle rack for short term parking and converted a one-bedroom unit into a bachelor to provide long term bicycle parking, al to eliminate variances 2,3 & 4.

A new hearing date was set for January 2025 but due to a heavy snowstorm, the hearing date was deferred once again, in addition, which meant that notices would have to be recirculated too! A new hearing date was set for the end of February 2025, and on this occasion, I attended the hearing virtually and the Committee accepted the elimination of the 3 variances and approved variance 1.

A few days later, I received a letter confirming the Committee's Decision and a few weeks late I received the Final and Binding letter, which meant I was now clear to apply for a Building Permit. During all the preceding procedures, I had been continuing with the working drawings complete with all the general notes, specifications and legends, ready to be sealed and signed together with all the necessary documentation. So, the permit application was done very quickly.

You would think that was a "slam dunk". Unfortunately, the worst was yet to come. We submitted the drawings and pertinent documents and duly paid the application fee, a moderate \$2,000.00. But after several months of haggling with the plans examiner and everything was in order for the issuance of the permit, we were hit with an invoice for \$538,000.00 in development charges (DC) and another \$112,000.00 in park levies (PL), that's almost \$31,000.00 per unit. Well, of course, the whole thing ground to an abrupt halt and, as you can imagine my client went ballistic and insisted that I find a way to get these charges dropped or at the, very least, be substantially reduced Otherwise the project will be a nonstarter as they could never recoup that amount of capital spending.

With regard to the DC and PL, I have spoken with two of my colleagues, one a municipal lawyer and the other an urban planner and their recommendation was to reach out to the Ward Councillor and/or the Chair of the Housing Board. I have taken their advice and reached out to both but still waiting for any replies.

If you have not fallen asleep and still reading this rather lengthy article, I am sure you can understand my frustration with the entire process. My takeaway from all of this is that the province and the municipalities need to be far more ruthless with the Acts, rules, regulations, time frames and approvals if they ever want to successfully get the quota of affordable housing that is needed. I do apologize for my rant, but it really is a matter that concerns me a lot, and I will continue to do my part to lower all the restrictions and increase the number of inexpensive accommodations for low-income families.

I look forward to bringing more updates on this terrible situation with affordable rental housing in future editions of the E-Specifier but in the meantime if you have any questions or suggestions, please do not hesitate to contact me on 416 571 5322 or by email brian.abbey@adtekbuilding.com
