TREASURER'S UPDATE

As Treasurer, I am typically called upon to provide a financial update at the start of each new fiscal year and again in September, when our dinner meetings and CSC programs resume.

Although I missed the September Specifier deadline, it was fortunately not a major concern, as there was little to report over the summer aside from our very successful CSC Golf Tournament held in August.

Now that we're well into the fall, I'm pleased to share a more detailed update.

First and foremost, our financial assets remain securely invested in one-year term deposits with TD Canada Trust and the Bank of Nova Scotia. Our ongoing goal is to ensure the CSC Toronto Chapter has sufficient reserves to remain financially stable for up to three years — even in the event of unforeseen challenges such as another pandemic. At present, we have achieved approximately 70% of that target.

In keeping with our commitment to providing valuable programs and opportunities for our members, planning is already well underway for our 2025 and 2026 activities — including educational sessions, monthly dinner meetings with engaging

presentations, the annual golf tournament, social events, and our flagship Building Expo Trade Show to be held on February 25, 2026.

The Chapter Executive recently approved the preliminary fiscal year expense budget, which establishes clear program-specific allocations for each initiative and Executive Committee activity. Working together with our Chapter Director, Chair, and Vice-Chair, we have also developed a new internal financial tracking tool. This will enable us to more accurately assess and report our financial position — both overall and by program — on a quarterly basis to the Executive Committee.

I am honoured to serve as your acting Treasurer and look forward to hearing your ideas on how we can continue to engage members and strengthen participation in our events.

Thank you for your confidence and support — and special thanks to the Executive Committee and our accounting partners at HFPC, who have been instrumental in helping us enhance our financial tracking abilities since the start of this fiscal year.

November already — this year has flown by with all the excellent events hosted by our CSC Toronto Chapter (CSCTC). These events remind me why we volunteer: to support one another and stay connected as a community. I am happy to continue serving as your CSC Engineering Officer for the 2025–2026 term.

CSCTC and CSC Grand Valley Chapter are pleased to share exciting progress and momentum surrounding the Student Design Competition (SDC) for the 2024-2025 year, highlighting expanding academic partnerships, student engagement, and program development.

Complete contest requirements, details, updates and pertinent links will be posted on the "Tapping the Future" Student Design Challenge website: www.cscdesignchallenge.ca. We saw a strong outreach and participation from post-secondary architecture and design programs. We held presentations at George Brown College, University of Waterloo School of Architecture, and Fanshawe College. University of Waterloo is expanding its curriculum to a full semester architecture program and will incorporate the SDC into their program. Students expressed valuable feedback and shared appreciations for CSC's involvement, noting the valuable insight into specifications and career pathways that extend beyond classroom learning.

This year's competition showcased 17 submissions, which were reviewed by four judges from the design and construction industry. The top five finalists were:

The topic of tariffs has been a significant point of discussion since our neighbour's announcement on April 2, 2025. Many have wondered if it was a belated April Fool's joke, leading to widespread speculation and uncertainty within the industry. Amidst this confusion, it is reassuring to see a national joint committee, such as the Canadian Construction Documents Committee (CCDC), addressing these concerns. The CCDC, which includes various nationally recognized organizations, industry legal representatives, and construction owner representatives from both the public and private sectors, has released bulletins to clarify the situation. CSC is one of the four national organizations that
